# **Are the biblical accounts trustworthy?** (Continued from Part 1)

The bible has been copied and translated so many times, how can we possibly know what was originally written?

Other ancient documents citing the New Testament<sup>3</sup>:

- The writings of the Apostolic Fathers (AD 90 to 160) contain a wealth of allusions and quotations from the New Testament
- The writings of the heretical Gnostic School of Valentinus (mid 2<sup>nd</sup> century)

The New Testament that we have today is 99.5% true to the original writings. <sup>4</sup>

Jewish tradition after the time of Jesus (Jerusalem Talmud, Babylonian Talmud, Toledoth Yeshu) was critical of Christ, but did not deny that he performed miracles. The Rabbis admitted that Jesus performed amazing wonders, but attributed his miracle working to sorcery. Celsus, an early critic of Christianity, said that Jesus picked up his miracle-working powers in Egypt. Even the Jewish historian Josephus who was not a Christian, wrote around 90 AD that Jesus did "surprising works."

#### A reflection on the supernatural universe

We may firmly believe that Jesus performed miracles (including the greatest miracle of all – his own resurrection) and yet fall asleep to the reality that we continue to live in a supernatural universe - a universe where God himself intervenes to change the lives of his children in profound ways and bring glory to himself. He doesn't merely extend man's earthly life, he does something much greater. He remakes man into his own image for all to witness.

"If we are not careful, even though we say we are biblical Christians and supernaturalists, nevertheless the naturalism of our generation tends to come in upon us. It may infiltrate our thinking without our recognizing its coming, like a fog creeping in through a window opened only half an inch. As soon as this happens, Christians being to lose the reality of their Christian lives."

"If I am trying to live a Christian life while sitting in the chair of unfaith, certain things are true. First of all it is done in the flesh. I do not care what my activity may be; I do not care how much noise I make about soul-winning evangelism, or exotic things, for example. It is still in the flesh."

"Hudson Taylor said, 'the Lord's work done in the Lord's way will never fail to have the Lord's provision'. . . I would paraphrase his saying like this: The Lord's work done in human energy is not the Lord's work any longer. It is something, but it is not the Lord's work.

"If I am trying to live a Christian life while sitting in the chair or unfaith, I am only playing at it, rather than being in it, because the real battle is not against flesh and blood, it is in the "heavenlies," and I cannot participate in that battle in the flesh. In times of war, while the big brothers are away in the real battle, the little boys at home play soldiers. They act like soldiers all right, but they have no contact with or any influence on the real battle being fought. When I try to live a Christian life while sitting in the chair of unfaith, I am just playing at war. I am not in contact with the real battle at all."
